Artists unite to call for greater diversity in the arts on International Women's Day

An international feminist exhibition showcasing a wealth of artists is coming to London.

In celebration of International Women's Day on 8 March 2018, 40 boundary breaking feminist artists will exhibit in *Empowerment*, a show co-curated by <u>Creative Debuts</u> and <u>Nasty Women Exhibition</u> in New York in collaboration with Nasty Women movements in North East England, London, Amsterdam, Lisbon, and Brussels.

The exhibition <u>Empowerment</u> coincides with International Women's Day and will take place in Shoreditch, London. "<u>Empowerment</u> is calling for greater diversity in the arts and accelerating gender equality" says Calum Hall, Co-Founder of Creative Debuts.

In September 2017, Creative Debuts successfully held their first feminist art show with Nasty Women Exhibition London with over 3,000 people attending the opening night alone. *Empowerment* is the second exhibition held in London with the Nasty Women movement. "We try to listen hard to our community and represent their views" says Calum Hall, Co-Founder of Creative Debuts. "Last year, many of our female artists expressed the challenges they have faced in the being recognised, exhibiting, and selling their work. We felt it was important to support them and offer a space to address the issues they had experienced."

<u>Creative Debuts</u> is part of Nasty Women's global art movement set up in reaction to growing misogyny and exclusion experienced by female creatives. The movement, which was founded in New York in January 2017, takes its name from a comment Donald Trump made about Hillary Clinton during a televised debate in the run up to the US Presidential elections. The term was reclaimed by women who used social media to rally, and empower others to take a stand for women's rights and gender equality.

"Nasty Women New York has teamed up with Creative Debuts to fulfil its responsibility of continuing to support the feminist movement" says Carolina Wheat-Nielsen, Curator and Organiser of Nasty Women Exhibition in NYC. "It is important that all genders are included as part of the debate. Empowerment has been as inclusive as possible welcoming submissions from artists regardless of their gender, sexual orientation, experience with art, or political viewpoints." Artists from as far and wide as the United States, Nigeria, New Zealand, Iran, Germany, Netherlands, Greece, Sweden, and the UK will be exhibiting at *Empowerment*. Works including photography, collage, digital art, fine art, sculpture, craft, and ceramics. Part of the money raised from the exhibition will be donated to End Violence Against Women Coalition to protect women's rights worldwide.

Highlights include

- Los Angeles-based <u>Lila Ash's</u> digitally illustrated comic series are inspired by true stories based on people who identify with the #MeToo movement that anonymously submitted to her via social media.
- British Iranian artist <u>Sanya Torkmorad-Jozavi's</u> Acid Attack aims to put a spotlight on her experiences and fears of living in London due to the increasing reports of attacks towards Muslims, threat of ISIS, and Brexit referendum due to her appearance. By using performative art, Sanya wanted to capture these repeated acts of violence by solidifying the verbal and physical experiences Muslim women in particular are subjected to. The photograph is of Sanya in traditional Iranian clothing with splashes of white paint to represent the men behind these unprovoked acid attacks.
- <u>Viagra Vuitton</u> (Timothy Martin) is a drag artist exploring the spectrum of gender and art
 through documentarian style photography. She herself values her nastiness, and strives to
 be a feminine icon showcasing all the best and dirtiest aspects of the Femme Fatale. *VIAGRA*is purely based on narcissism she hates to go unnoticed and adores herself believing she is
 the star of any show and this is how every woman should see herself. Putting loyalty to their
 sisters above all.
- The Sustain Series by London-based Helena Cardow are a series of photographs that capture a conceptual collection of garments tackling a range of themes and are shot in the streets of Lagos. The Condom Dress highlights issues around safe sex and the HIV crisis in Africa, The TV Dress tackles the e-waste and recycling issues created by modern societies, and The Magazine Dress is fashioned from the discarded pages of consumerism. Often marginalised in society, the black female models are celebrated and captured as the Critical Cover girl.
- Pal Kumar was intrigued and inspired by the intricate almost conflicting relationship between the stillness of realism and dynamism of movement. In his hyper-realistic drawing My Grandmother's Nature, he focuses celebrating his family by drawing his grandmother who impacted his artistic journey.

"A lot of work still needs to be done to make the art world more inclusive" says Calum Hall, Co-Founder of Creative Debuts. "Empowerment is just the start! We will build on this work later in the year with *The Anti Art Fair* to continue challenging perceptions, create debate, and offer a platform to those on the margins of the art sector."

Empowerment will be a preview to <u>The Anti Art Fair</u> that will take place on 4 - 7 October 2018. Creative Debuts will be working with a range of partners to deliver *The Anti Art Fair* to coincide with Frieze Art Fair in London. The fair will be a celebration of creativity and the voice for change in the art world that puts the creators at centre stage. "Following on from Creative Debuts' support for equality, female empowerment, diversity and accessibility" says Calum Hall "*The Anti Art Fair* will be a direct response to the sterilised, exclusive and money driven art world."
